1995-1996

By the mid 90's Broward County was in the midst of a growing homeless problem. For more than 5 years, a series of temporary solutions eventually culminated into "Tent City". The situation, however, did not improve.

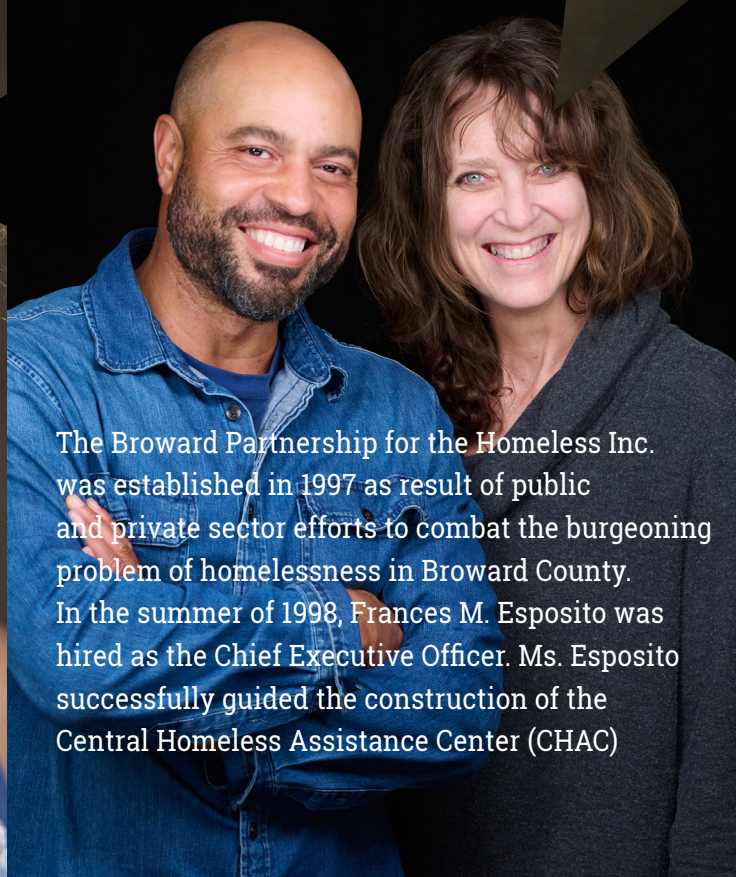


VISION & COURAGE

It took the resources of a handful of community and business leaders to find a solution. They were tasked with creating a public/private partnership to serve the increasing homeless population and put an end to "Tent City".



The Partnership was charged with raising the funds necessary to build and operate a new emergency homeless assistance center. The community leaders turned to entrepreneur, H. Wayne Huizenga, who pledged \$1 million towards the construction, while James A. Cummings, owner of one of South Florida's leading commercial construction companies, secured \$1.8 million of in-kind contributions.



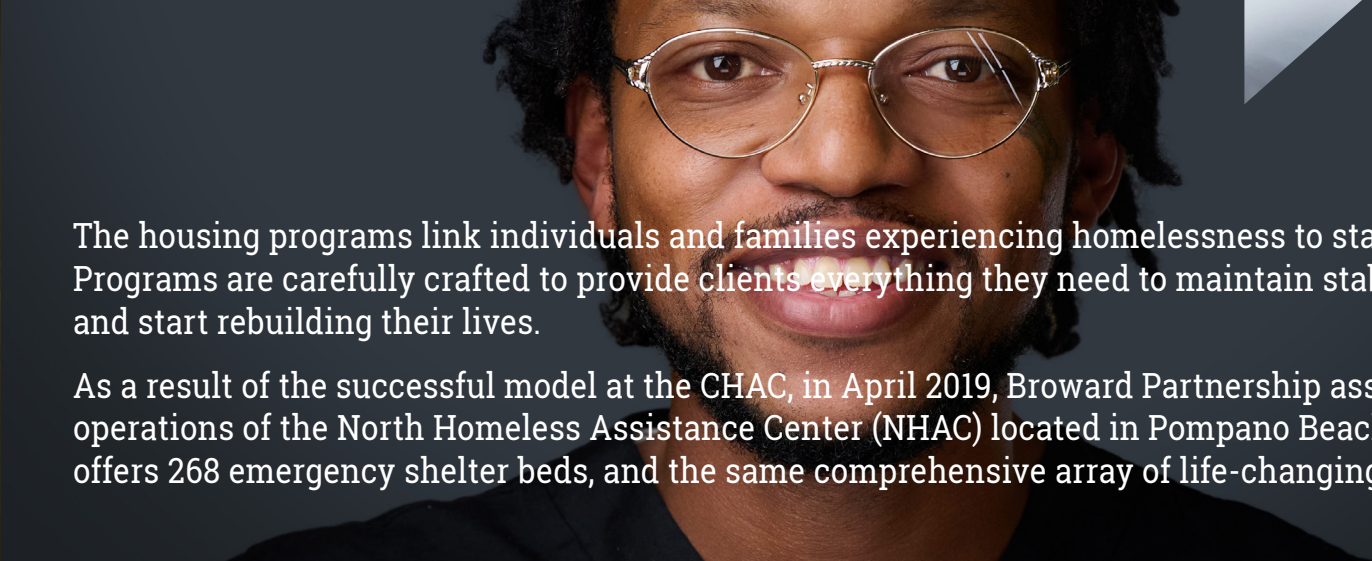
The Broward Partnership for the Homeless Inc. was established in 1997 as result of public and private sector efforts to combat the burgeoning problem of homelessness in Broward County. In the summer of 1998, Frances M. Esposito was hired as the Chief Executive Officer. Ms. Esposito successfully guided the construction of the Central Homeless Assistance Center (CHAC)



In February of 1999, the Partnership officially opened the Central Homeless Assistance Center (CHAC), a 57,000 sq. ft. emergency homeless assistance center near downtown Fort Lauderdale.

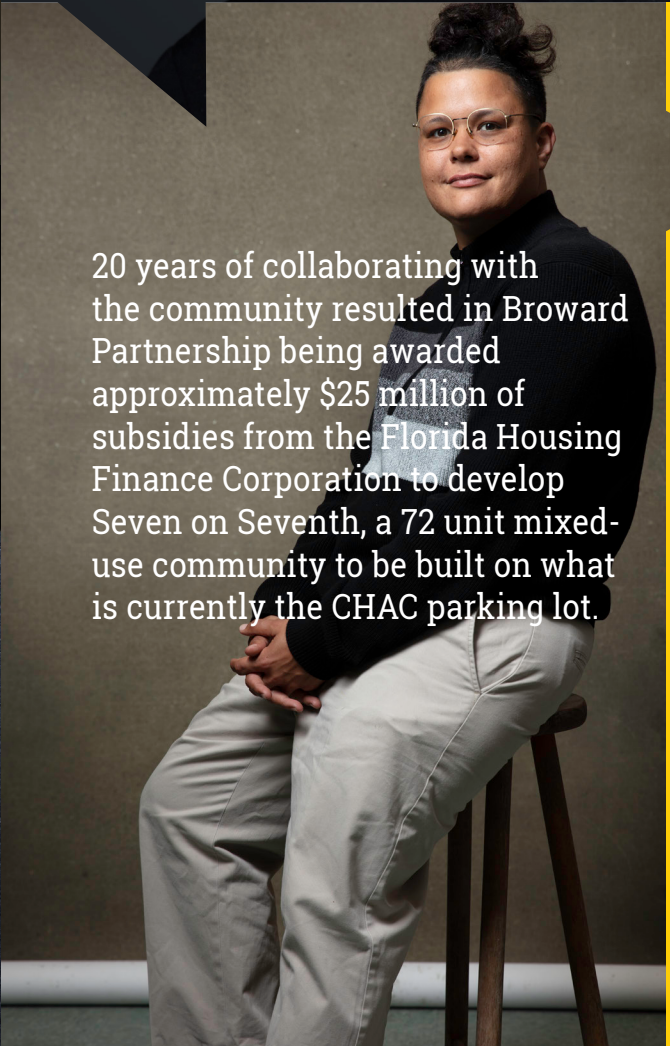


Today The CHAC offers 230 emergency shelter beds, rapid re-housing, scattered-site permanent supportive housing interventions and a complete array of health and social services.

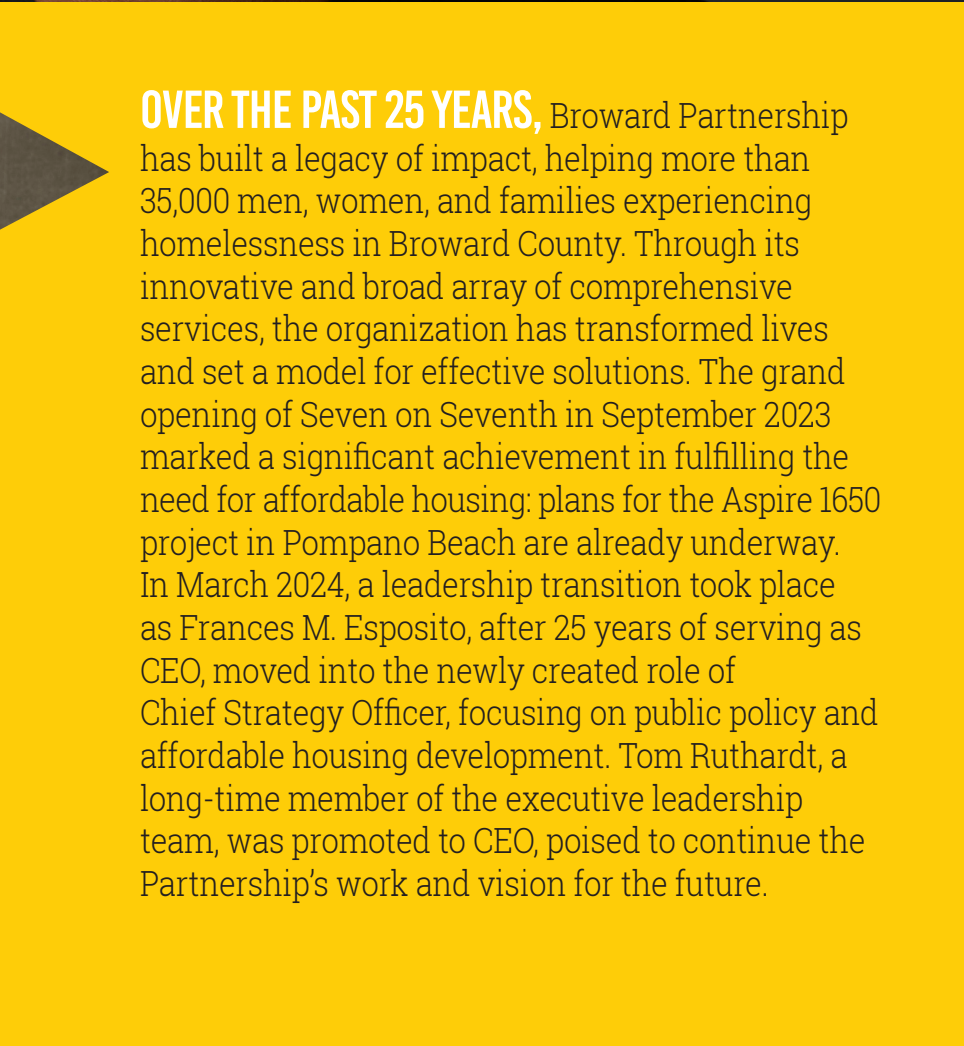


The housing programs link individuals and families experiencing homelessness to stable housing. Programs are carefully crafted to provide clients everything they need to maintain stable housing and start rebuilding their lives.

As a result of the successful model at the CHAC, in April 2019, Broward Partnership assumed operations of the North Homeless Assistance Center (NHAC) located in Pompano Beach. The NHAC offers 268 emergency shelter beds, and the same comprehensive array of life-changing services.



20 years of collaborating with the community resulted in Broward Partnership being awarded approximately \$25 million of subsidies from the Florida Housing Finance Corporation to develop Seven on Seventh, a 72 unit mixed-use community to be built on what is currently the CHAC parking lot.



OVER THE PAST 25 YEARS, Broward Partnership has built a legacy of impact, helping more than 35,000 men, women, and families experiencing homelessness in Broward County. Through its innovative and broad array of comprehensive services, the organization has transformed lives and set a model for effective solutions. The grand opening of Seven on Seventh in September 2023 marked a significant achievement in fulfilling the need for affordable housing: plans for the Aspire 1650 project in Pompano Beach are already underway. In March 2024, a leadership transition took place as Frances M. Esposito, after 25 years of serving as CEO, moved into the newly created role of Chief Strategy Officer, focusing on public policy and affordable housing development. Tom Ruthardt, a long-time member of the executive leadership team, was promoted to CEO, poised to continue the Partnership's work and vision for the future.

Our commitment to long-term housing solutions led to the development of Seven on Seventh, a 72-unit mixed-use supportive and affordable housing community that opened in September 2023 and provides safe and stable housing for low-income and formerly homeless individuals and families. As the largest comprehensive homeless services provider in Broward County, we have provided critical support to over 35,000 individuals and families, helping them become productive members of society. These milestones reflect our dedication to creating sustainable solutions and empowering those we serve.

None of this would have been possible without the generosity of our donors and stakeholders, the dedication of our volunteers, the leadership of our board, and the commitment of our staff. Together, we have demonstrated that hope is stronger than hardship, and that by working collectively, we can break the cycle of homelessness for generations to come.

Broward Partnership's commitment remains steadfast in providing comprehensive services and resources that empower individuals and families experiencing homelessness, fostering pathways to stability and self-sufficiency. Every person deserves the dignity of a home and the opportunity to thrive. Thank you for being part of this journey. THE FACE OF CONFIDENCE

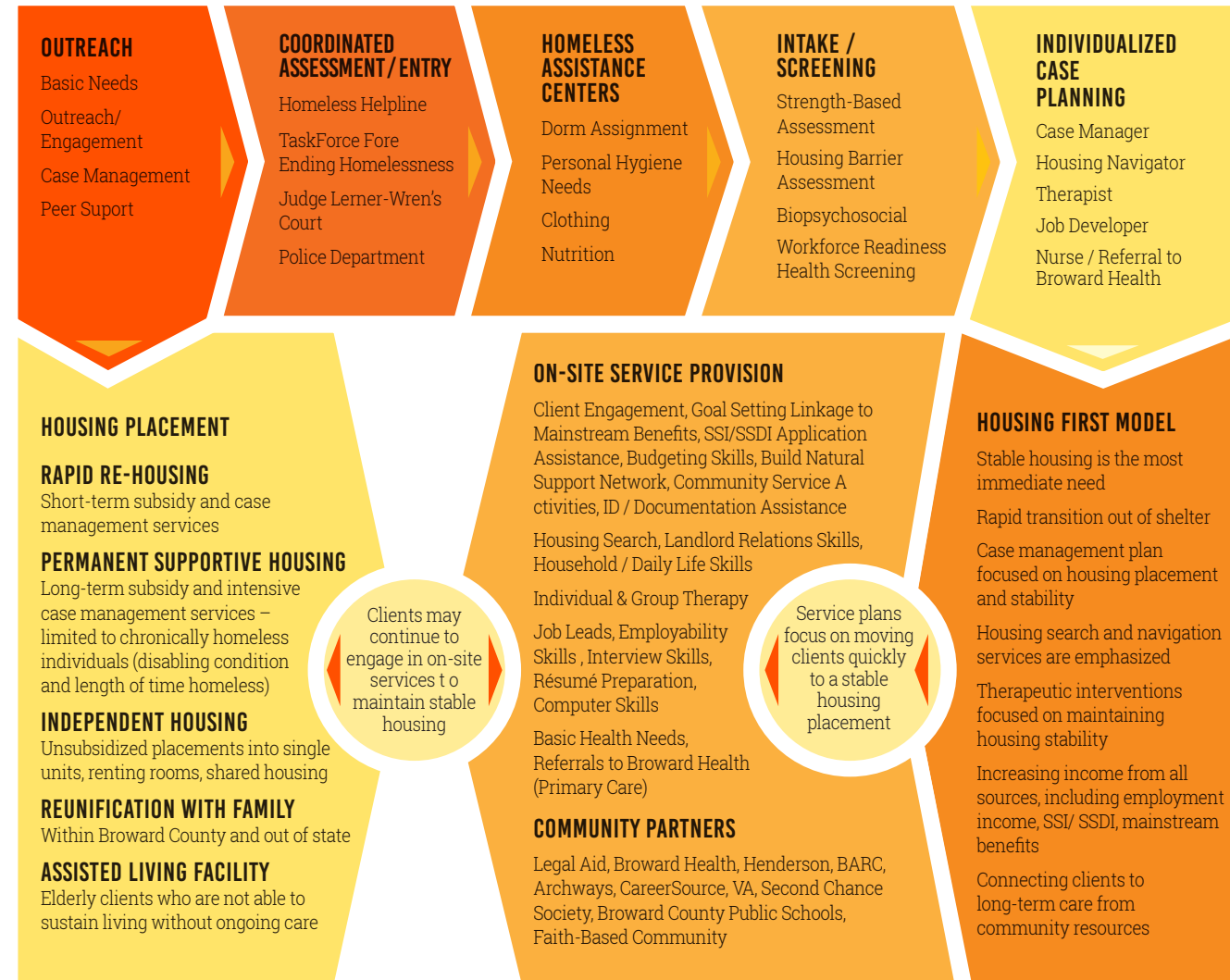
TENEZIA:

THE FACE OF INDEPENDENCE

PAUL:**"It's beautiful to be on the sober side of addiction."**

Grateful, energetic, and compassionate, Paul has spent 15 years working in transportation and gaining experience in carpentry and electrical work. A back injury led to gaps in his career, which ultimately resulted in homelessness and struggles with addiction. Since joining the Partnership, Paul has embraced a disciplined approach to life and has maintained his sobriety. Now, he's focusing on building a stable future and saving money as he prepares to leave the nest and start a new chapter of independence.

MOVING FORWARD WITH HEALTH AND WELLNESS

HEALTHCARE CLINICS:

Homelessness is a key social determinant of health, directly impacting overall well-being. The instability that homelessness creates makes accessing consistent healthcare and safely storing medications difficult, exacerbating chronic conditions such as high blood pressure, diabetes, and asthma. Medical professionals at the Partnership's healthcare clinics assess every adult client upon intake, conduct thorough medical examinations, and provide urgent and primary care services. The clinics also offer health and lifestyle education on smoking cessation, nutrition, chronic disease management, substance use, and other essential services to help clients better understand and manage their health.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH:

Homelessness often intersects with mental illness and substance use challenges. While some individuals cope with acute mental illness triggered by past traumas—such as abuse, brain injuries, or the profound impact of homelessness itself—others experience psychiatric disorders and chemical addictions requiring long-term treatment. The Partnership provides outpatient mental health treatment services for clients to overcome these barriers to housing stability. Clients receive evidence-based, trauma-informed care delivered by Master's-level therapists, licensed clinicians, and a psychiatrist. This approach incorporates clinical best practices to holistically address each client's unique needs, enhance their well-being, and, most importantly, facilitate their transition out of homelessness as swiftly as possible.

DENTAL CARE:

For individuals experiencing homelessness, dental health is often overlooked in favor of immediate needs like shelter and food. However, poor oral health can lead to severe medical conditions, including tooth loss, gum disease, and chronic pain, while also affecting self-confidence. The Partnership's Smiles Work! dental program ensures homeless adults receive essential oral health care at no cost, helping to restore both health and dignity.



THE FACE OF RESILIENCE

JEFFREY:

“Today is the tomorrow you worried about yesterday.”

Determined, resilient, and honest, Jeffrey faced both depression and substance misuse, which led to employment instability and homelessness. After completing a detox program, Jeffrey came to Broward Partnership ready to rebuild his life. Thanks to the support of key partners in the Workforce Development Program, he’s now pursuing a career as a full-time barber. Jeffrey is excited for the future, where housing stability will bring him the freedom he’s been working toward.

MOVING FORWARD TO STABLE HOUSING

Broward County's affordable housing crisis makes it increasingly difficult for individuals to transition out of homelessness—even with employment—and just as challenging to remain housed. In June 2023, the Broward County Housing Finance Division reported an average rent of \$2,800, and a shortfall of 74,000 affordable units. By March 2024, the Housing Broward: 10-Year Affordable Housing Master Plan revealed this deficit had grown to 147,000 units, with 54% of renters cost-burdened, spending more than 30% of their income on housing.

Broward Partnership is dedicated to helping individuals experiencing homelessness regain housing stability and economic independence. Through solution-focused services, including housing navigation, workforce development, and other critical support, we ease the challenge of transitioning from shelter to stable housing amid the escalating crisis.

EMERGENCY SHELTER:

The Central and North Homeless Assistance Centers (CHAC and NHAC) operate as low barrier shelters. The low-barrier model aligns with the Housing First approach, which prioritizes the swift transition into stable housing, recognizing that a safe, habitable place to live is essential to rebuilding one's life. All clients access supportive services to improve their health, increase income, and maintain housing. The Partnership's ultimate objective is to transition individuals and families experiencing homelessness into stable housing as quickly as possible.

RAPID RE-HOUSING:

For individuals and families experiencing situational homelessness, this intervention provides short-term assistance to help them regain stability. Clients receive housing location services, temporary rental support, and case management. A key component of the program, case management guides clients toward full independence once rental assistance ends.

PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING:

Designed specifically for chronically homeless individuals and families with disabling conditions, this intervention provides long-term rental assistance and intensive case management. These clients are among the most vulnerable of the homeless population, having a prolonged experience with homelessness and disabling conditions. Permanent supportive housing programs offer a high level of case management to help clients maintain stable housing.

THE FACE OF DETERMINATION



MAX:

“Keep your head up and be accountable for your actions.”

Determined, punctual, and considerate, Max faced financial instability and eventually found himself sleeping in his car, which was later repossessed. Desperate for a way out, Max learned about Broward Partnership. Since then, he has secured a part-time customer service job with U-Haul and is saving money for a fresh start. Grateful for this second chance, Max is determined to rebuild his life and embrace the future with optimism.

MOVING FORWARD THROUGH WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Broward Partnership proudly reflects on the transformative impact of its Workforce Development Program, a cornerstone of our mission to empower individuals and families on their journey out of homelessness. By offering job search assistance, résumé writing support, interview coaching, vocational training, and access to a computer lab for skills enhancement, the program equips clients with the tools they need to succeed.

A job with sustainable income is not just a steppingstone—it's a lifeline. The Workforce Development program provides tailored support to each client, addressing their unique needs through a comprehensive approach. Job readiness assessments evaluate strengths, needs, and career aspirations, while personalized development plans guide clients through the steps to obtain employment. Additionally, our dedicated Job Developers collaborate with local employers and community partners to provide job leads, training opportunities, and ongoing support, facilitating each client's transition to productive, self-sufficient lifestyles.

Through collaborations with employers, educational institutions, and political leaders, the program transcends traditional barriers to employment. Our quarterly job fairs have become a vital component of success, bringing clients face-to-face with employers actively seeking talented candidates. These events offer more than just job opportunities—they foster a community of support, where participants gain valuable insights, build professional networks, and find encouragement to pursue their goals. Our continued partnership with Broward College's Broward UP (Unlimited Potential) allowed more clients and family members access to training, certification programs, and degree programs.

State Representative Chip LaMarca, with bipartisan support from longtime affordable housing advocate State Senator Rosalind Osgood, facilitated a \$250,000 legislative appropriation to outfit the Workforce Development and Training Hub at Seven on Seventh, to provide residents with services such as computer and technology training and a variety of vocational courses in collaboration with community partners. The award also funded upgrades to existing workforce development learning spaces at the Central Homeless Assistance Center. These enhancements create a fully integrated learning interface between the two facilities.

Throughout the year, we are reminded of the lives that have been positively impacted through every résumé written, every skill mastered, and every job secured. It represents a step forward for our clients and our community. One success story at a time, we are building a stronger, more resilient future together.

Optimistic, spiritual, and grounded, Melonie left home for a fresh start in a new city, but shortly after arrival, she became homeless. With the guidance and support of her case manager, Melonie has embraced the process of personal growth and is actively job searching. She's focused on rebuilding her life and looks forward to creating a space where she can enjoy a peaceful life on her own terms, surrounded by the things she loves.

FAMILY SERVICES HELPING GENERATIONS MOVE FORWARD

Broward Partnership's Family Services program helps families transition from homelessness to housing stability as quickly as possible while addressing their complex challenges along the way. The program provides safe, short-term shelter, nutritious meals, childcare, family therapy, and targeted support services that promote long-term self-sufficiency. While enrolled in the Family Services program, families access:

INDIVIDUAL AND FAMILY THERAPY SESSIONS LED BY CERTIFIED COUNSELORS FOR BOTH PARENTS AND CHILDREN.

SUPPORT GROUPS THAT ALLOW FAMILY MEMBERS TO SHARE THEIR EXPERIENCES AND LEARN FROM EACH OTHER.

FAMILY ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES THAT BRING PARENTS AND CHILDREN TOGETHER TO HELP IMPROVE FAMILY DYNAMICS.

TRANSPORTATION TO SCHOOL AND AFTERCARE PROGRAMS TO ENSURE CHILDREN CONTINUE THEIR EDUCATION AND ENRICHMENT WITHOUT DISRUPTION.

THE PARTNERSHIP RENEWED ITS COLLABORATION WITH THE YOUNG AT ART MUSEUM TO OFFER FAMILY ART NIGHT PROGRAMMING AT THE CENTRAL AND NORTH HOMELESS ASSISTANCE CENTER. THE INITIATIVE HIGHLIGHTED THE TRANSFORMATIVE POWER OF ART BY PROVIDING A SPACE WHERE FAMILIES COULD BOND WHILE EXPLORING CREATIVE AND EMOTIONAL EXPRESSIONS. THROUGH THE USE OF VARIOUS TEXTURES, MATERIALS, AND THEIR SENSES, PARTICIPANTS ENGAGED IN AN ENVIRONMENT THAT FOSTERED CREATIVITY. DURING THE CLASS, FAMILIES NOT ONLY EMBRACED THEIR ARTISTIC ABILITIES BUT ALSO LEARNED ABOUT DIFFERENT FORMS OF ART.

To enhance its services, the Partnership collaborates with a wide range of community partners, including healthcare agencies, mental health and substance abuse treatment providers, educational and employment organizations, childcare and family service providers, law enforcement, Broward County Public Schools, and local and state governments. Recognizing the importance of stability for children, the Partnership helps families access essential items such as graduation caps and gowns, prom attire, school portraits, yearbooks, and school supplies—ensuring that youth can fully participate in key social milestones alongside their peers. Additionally, The Jim Moran Foundation's Families First! Rapid Re-Housing program supports families in securing permanent housing while providing up to one year of case management to help them maintain long-term stability.

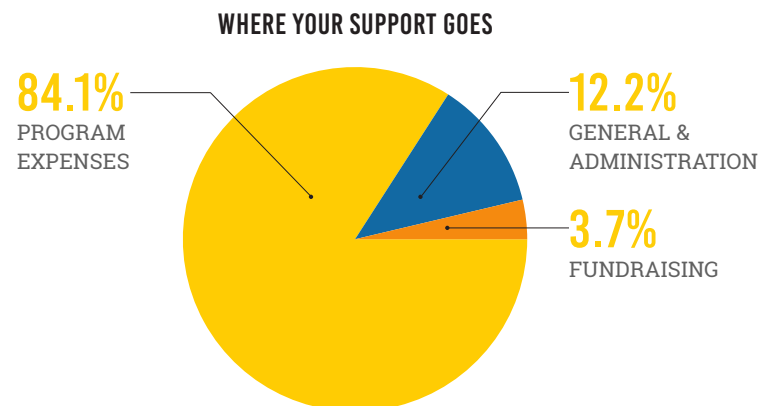

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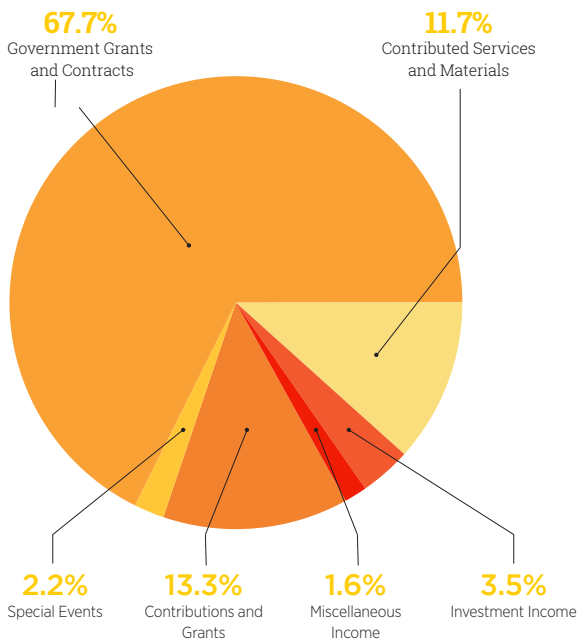

“When obstacles come your way, you find other ways to avoid them.”

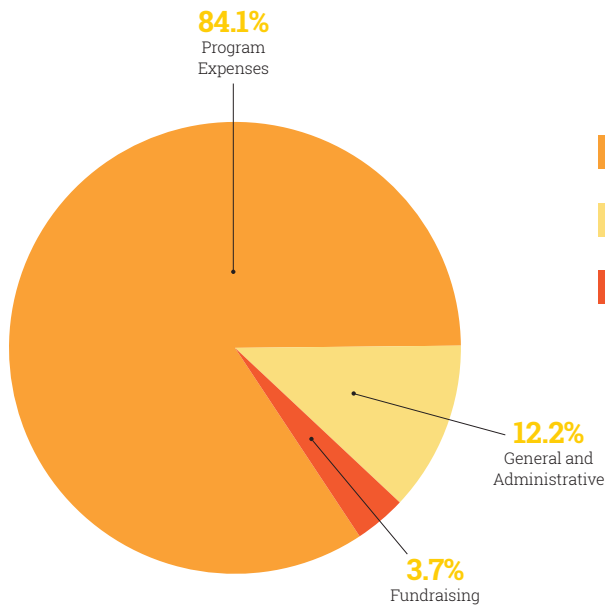
